The university and the city

Founded in 1919 and named after T. G. Masaryk, the first President of Czechoslovakia, Masaryk University is a modern university with an established tradition. Today, it comprises nine faculties – Economics and Administration, Education, Informatics, Law, Medicine, Science, Social Studies, and Sports Studies – and more than 200 departments and institutes. The university is dedicated to the overall support of research and innovation, focusing as well on the transfer of knowledge to the spheres of applied science and commercial use. This mission is clearly visible in the superb teaching and research facilities of the new university campus and in the first Czech polar station in Antarctica.

Masaryk University is located in Brno, the second largest city in the Czech Republic (400 000 inhabitants), close to Austrian and Slovak capitals Vienna and Bratislava. Brno is a lively interesting city with a wide selection of cultural and sport activities which hosts a number of exciting events.

All incoming students receive assistance, information materials, and are invited to Orientation Week organized by the Centre for International Cooperation together with the International Student Club. Buddy system is provided, too.

The Faculty of Social Studies which is responsible for running EIUC activities in the Czech Republic, became an independent faculty of Masaryk University in 1998 when it disaffiliated from the Faculty of Arts. The newly reconstructed building of the faculty, located right in the city-centre, provides modern environment for study and work, with an instant Wi-Fi internet connection, computers labs, specialized multimedia rooms and a modern rich library. The new building is interesting also from an architectural point of view with its large two-storey atrium hall offering space for discussions as well as cultural events and performances. The Faculty supports active student club that runs a photo gallery, cafe, tearoom and space for extra-curricular activities.
